Morning Routine


- Coat and bag into locker

- 9:00am register and handwriting


Water Bottles and Snack

- Water bottles need to be labelled with your child's name
- Snacks for morning and/or afternoon break time should be <u>healthy</u> (no cakes, cake bars, biscuits etc and <u>nothing containing</u> <u>nuts</u>)
- Snacks labelled with your child's name or in a small container with their name on it
- Fruit is usually available in the classroom

<u>Handwriting</u>

- Daily handwriting sessions
- Children begin to learn cursive handwriting in Year One
- All lowercase letters begin on the baseline as shown below





Our Curriculum

In Year One, children have discrete lessons in:

- English (reading & writing)
- Maths
- Phonics
- P.E
- Music
- French

They also have Big Idea which include lessons in: science, history, geography, art, DT, computing, R.E

<u>What does learning look like in Year</u> <u>One?</u>

- <u>Whole class</u>: children on the carpet, teacher modelling, sharing of ideas, practise of task
- <u>Independent practise time</u>: short task at the table, in working groups, some adult support
- Choosing activities once independent task completed

As the year progresses, independent tasks increase in length and choosing time reduces.

- Teaching of new graphemes and phonemes
- Revisiting and consolidating
- Keep-up and catch sessions
- Statutory Phonic screening June 2025

Reading at Home

- We would like children to read at home to an adult at least 4 times a week
- Re-read texts read at school
- Reading at home is all about reading <u>fluency</u> and applying <u>secure</u> Phonic knowledge
- It should be EASY!!
- Reading record cards and books need to be kept in book bags so they are accessible for additional reading in school
- Reading books are changed every Friday
- Books <u>must be returned</u> to school each week we will follow it up you if they are not returned!!

- Please tick the reading card each time your child reads
- Stickers will be awarded every Friday if your child has read at least 4 times
- Their name will also be entered into a prize draw every time they read 4 times giving them the chance to win an extra prize at the end of each half term

- Complete task on <u>1 page</u> in the fluency activities book
- Return fluency books on Friday for checking




Optional Homework

- Optional activities to do at home



P.E Information

- Two P.E lessons each week Tuesday and Wednesday.
- Children will need suitable clothing for colder/warmer weather.
- Please make sure <u>ALL</u> clothing is clearly labelled with your child's name.
- P.E kits should stay at school in your child's locker.
- No earrings on P.E days please.

- To keep everyone happy, please make sure ALL your child's uniform and belongings are clearly labelled with their name.
- No toys please!





Helping at Home

- 1. Children should read to you at least 4 times a week.
- 2. Encourage children to use their Phonic skills and knowledge when they are out and about e.g. reading signs, labels, notices etc.
- 3. Listen to stories and talk about the events and characters and predict what might happen next.
- 4. Help your child to form lower case letters in the correct direction.
- 5. Help your child to practise forming cursive letters.
- 6. Help your child to make good choices when spelling words; encourage them to use their Phonic knowledge.
- 7. Help your child to count up to and beyond 100 in ones; try starting at different places e.g 34, 57 etc.
- 8. Help your child to count forwards and backwards.
- 9. Practise counting in 2s, 5s and 10s up to at least 50.
- 10. Help your child to form numerals correctly and use these to write numbers up to 100.
- 11. Help your child to learn how to spell number words up to twenty.
- 12. Look for and name common shapes in everyday objects e.g circle, square, cube, sphere etc.
