This newsletter will focus on Safer Internet Day 2025.

Safer Internet Day, held on Tuesday 11th February, is the UK's biggest celebration of online safety. Each year Safer Internet Day covers online issues or themes that speak to the things young people are seeing and experiencing online.

The 2025 Safer Internet Day theme is: 'Too good to be true? Protecting yourself and others from

This week, KS1 and KS2 have celebrated Safer Internet Day within key stage assemblies and class discussions.

KS1 listened to the story 'Chicken Clicking' by Jeanne Willis, which subtly introduces the topic of online safety via an imaginative story of a thrill-seeking chicken. KS2 discussed what scams are, the forms that they may take, how it might make people feel and who to talk to if encountering a scam.
